2. ARTS, CULTURE & HERITAGE

The Leche Trust - Performing Arts and the Conservation of Historic Objects Funds

The Trust's Main Grants Programme offers grants under two streams – Performing Arts and Conservation. Both streams offer grants of up to £5,000 but the average grant is £2,000. Trustees are inclined to give grants to smaller projects, or specific elements of projects, where their contribution can make a greater impact.

Performing Arts - Priorities for music, theatre and dance are:

- Excellence in professional performance;
- The production and performance of new work;
- The development of young, professional artists aged 18 or over.

Trustees are sympathetic to projects that widen geographical access to the performing arts, for example through festivals and touring.

Conservation - Projects to conserve historic objects, collections and features of buildings and landscapes which date from the Georgian period or earlier, i.e. pre-1830s. Projects may include acquisition costs (for objects) and conservation surveys as well as remedial work. In the case of churches, Trustees will consider supporting the conservation of such features as monuments, wall paintings, stained glass, and historic furniture and fittings. **The next closing date for applications is 7th May 2021**

Music for All - Community Project Funding Grant Scheme

Grants are available to UK based community groups and educational organisations to bring music to their community and to establish themselves as a sustainable music programme. The funding can be put towards musical instrument costs, workshops/training, using music to break down barriers, providing a variety of educational opportunities as well as helping to find ways to integrate many diverse and minority groups positively into society. Applicants are encouraged to look for other sources of funding to add to the amount needed to deliver the project. **The closing date for applications is 14th May 2021.**

The Elephant Trust – Grants

The Trust offers grants to artists and for new, innovative visual arts projects to make it possible for them, and those presenting their work, to undertake and complete projects when confronted by lack of funds. It supports projects that develop and improve the knowledge, understanding and appreciation of the fine arts. Priority is given to artists and small organisations and galleries making or producing new

work or exhibitions. Grants are normally awarded for up to £2,000, but larger grants of up to £5,000 may be considered. **The deadline for applications is midnight on 27th June 2021.**

Harold Hyam Wingate Foundation - Grants

The Foundation supports projects, institutions and activities in the following areas:

- Jewish Life and Learning
- Performing Arts (excluding music)
- Music
- Medical Research Travel grants

Applications are invited from smaller charitable organisations only. Applicants need to detail how the funding they are seeking can be used under the constraints of the current HM Govt Coronavirus (COVID-19) guidance for the sector. **The deadline for applications is 9th June 2021.**

National Churches Trust – Foundation Small Maintenance Grants Programme

Churches across the UK can apply for grants of between £500 and £5,000 towards the cost of urgent maintenance works and small repairs. Project costs should be up to £10,000 excl. VAT and awards will never exceed 50% of the costs. Applications are accepted from listed and unlisted Christian places of worship, of any denomination. **Application are being accepted on a rolling basis.**

PRS for Music Foundation - Women Make Music Grants Programme

Women, trans and non binary songwriters and composers of all genres and backgrounds are eligible to apply for grants of up to £5,000 to support touring, recording, promotion and marketing, community projects involving high-quality music creators, music creator residencies and live performances featuring new UK music. The programme supports the development of outstanding women songwriters and composers at different stages of their career. It aims to:

- Break down assumptions and stereotypes
- Raise awareness of the gender gap
- Increase the profile of women who are creating new music in the UK
- Encourage women who may otherwise not have applied for PRS for Music Foundation funding.

Please note that the PRS for Music Foundation no longer supports organisations through Women Make Music. **The deadline for applications is 6pm on 14th June 2021.**

3. BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT, EMPLOYMENT, EDUCATION & TRAINING

Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy - Restart Grant

The Restart Grant scheme will provide eligible businesses in the non-essential retail sector with a one-off grant of up to £6,000, and businesses in the hospitality, accommodation, leisure, personal care and gym sectors with a one-off grant of up to £18,000. Local councils will determine whether businesses meet the eligibility criteria, and the sum received will be based on their rateable value. Applications must be submitted via local council websites.

Thomas Wall Trust – Grants to Increase Literacy, Numeracy and Digital Skills

Grants of up to £5,000 are available to registered charities to assist with specific projects or core activities that support literacy, numeracy, digital and additional skills for people aged 11 or older in order to increase their employment prospects within the UK. To be eligible applicants must:

- Be a UK charity that has been registered with the Charity Commission for at least 3 years
- Be a project or running costs for a charity that equips people (aged 11 and over) with the skills ready for employment
- Have an annual turnover of less than £500,000

Annual repeat funding for up to 3 years is available subject to satisfactory annual reviews of progress and impact. **The deadline to submit an expression of interest is 30th April 2021.**

The Hellenic Society - Schools Sub-Committee Grants

Grants are available to schools to assist projects concerned with the teaching of Greek or Greek civilization. Typically, grants are made for:

- The development of new courses in Greek
- Books & other teaching materials
- Classics days or conferences
- Greek plays by schools
- Summer schools for school pupils

Applications from schools planning to start courses in Greek are especially welcome. Applications on behalf of individual pupils or teachers are not normally considered, but a grant may be made to an institution for use as bursaries to individuals at the discretion of that institution. Most grants are in the range £100-£500, but larger awards are occasionally made. **The closing date for applications is 1st May 2021.**

4. CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

Peter Harrison Foundation - Special Needs and Care for Children and Young People Programme

The Foundation seeks to support projects that work with or benefit disabled, chronically or terminally ill children and provide support for their parents and carers; that help to engage children or young people at risk of crime, truancy or addiction; and projects organised for young people at risk of homelessness or that provide new opportunities for homeless young people. There are two funds open to application:

- Opportunities through Sport
- Special Needs and Care for Children and Young People

Applications are only accepted from charities meeting the needs of children and young people in specified counties including Surrey. **Applications can be submitted at any time.**

Youth Endowment Fund – Another chance - Diversion from the criminal justice system

Fund has been launched to evaluate different diversion approaches that work best at preventing 10 to 17-year-olds in England and Wales from becoming involved in violence. Diversion approaches could include mental health support, whole family interventions or mentoring (for example). The Fund aims to identify around 10-20 programmes that are ready for robust impact evaluation or could be supported to reach this point within two years. Any organisation – including charities, public services or the private sector – that receive referrals from a relevant statutory service (for example, the police, schools, local youth offending team or social care) is eligible to apply. **There will be a Zoom webinar on Monday 26 April from 12pm – 1pm about the evaluation processes to assess projects.** The closing date for applications is 5pm on 14th May 2021.

BBC Children in Need - Emergency Essentials Programme

In response to the Covid-19 pandemic the fund is expanding their Emergency Essentials programme to include a broader range of basic essentials to support children and young people living with severe poverty across the UK. The fund supports families with children who are living with financial, health and social difficulties, by providing items that meet children's most basic needs such as kitchen appliances, furniture, baby equipment, beds, clothing, and other items and services that are critical to children's

wellbeing. Applications must come through a registered referral agency that is supporting the family or young person. **Applications can be made at any time.**

David Tyson Memorial Fund - Grants

The David Tyson Memorial Fund was established in David's memory to provide financial support to enable young people to develop their skills and pursue a career within the engineering field. The Fund supports budding young rail engineers with grants (up to £500) that can cover the following costs:

- Course fees;
- Accreditation;
- Resources such as books or additional computer software;
- Travel to courses and training sites;
- Equipment, materials or tools to enable young people to take up training; and
- Work-based training costs.

The Fund is being administered by the Community Foundation for Surrey.

5. COMMUNITY

Aviva - Community Fund

Funding of up to £50,000 is available to small charities, schools and community interest groups with innovative ideas that benefit their community. Every three months £250,000 will be split among Aviva's UK employees to donate to the projects that matter to them most. The Fund wishes to support projects that boost the resilience of communities in the face of uncertainty and focus on projects in two key areas:

- Community resilience: tackling inequality and improving environments by building inclusive and resilient communities; or
- Financial capability and inclusion: promoting financially inclusive communities, where people can better manage their finances and avoid problem debt

Applicants must also be raising funds to develop a new approach, product or technology, pilot a new scheme, implement a new initiative, or expand existing services to a new area or beneficiary group. Once applications have been submitted, applicants will need to create a fundraising page on Crowdfunder that Aviva employees can browse and donate funds to. Applicants can also showcase their projects to raise additional public donations. **Applications are open on a continuous basis and are reviewed every three months. The closing date is 23.59 on 6th July 2021.**

Co-op - Local Community Fund

This Fund benefits local communities centred around Co-op Food Stores and funeral homes across the UK. It is available for projects which help local communities come together to help those in need by providing access to essentials such as community spaces; food and bereavement support; support for the mental or physical health of a community through wellbeing activities; or help for people to develop skills to nurture community spirit and create sustainable communities. Registered charities, locally-based voluntary and community groups and other not-for-profit organisations are eligible to apply and preference will be given to organisations with an income of less than £1 million pa. **Applications open on 4th May 2021 and are considered on a rolling basis.**

Alpkit Foundation – Coronavirus Funding

The Foundation is prioritising funding to support projects that demonstrate an immediate impact on those affected by the coronavirus crisis. Grants are available to grassroots organisations serving those affected by the outbreak. Funding can provide support for activities which might include helping vulnerable and elderly people who are self-isolating, supporting the homeless, providing access to food, medicines or social care, supporting foodbanks, increasing the number of meals on wheels deliveries, and bringing exercise indoors. **Applications can be made at any time.**

6. DIVERSITY & EQUALITY

Lloyds Bank Foundation - Racial Equity funding programme

The programme supports charities with an annual income of between £25,000 and £1 million that are led by and support black, Asian, and ethnic minority (BAME) communities across England and Wales. Two-year unrestricted grants of £50,000 are available, along with development support to help build organisational capacity and improve resilience and sustainability. The funding will support initiatives which help people from BAME communities to overcome complex social issues such as:

- Addiction and dependency
- Asylum seekers and refugees
- Care leavers
- Domestic abuse
- Homelessness and vulnerably housed
- Learning disabilities

- Mental health
- Offending, prison or community service
- Sexual abuse and exploitation
- Trafficking and modern slavery
- Young parents

More than half of the trustee boards of those that apply must self-identify as Black, Asian or minority ethnic. This can also include Jewish communities, Gypsy & Traveller communities and some migrant communities. **Applications can be made at any time.**

UnLtd – Grants to Social Entrepreneurs

Grants, plus business support, are available to social entrepreneurs that are looking to start or grow an existing social venture. The grants are being made available through two funding streams:

- Grants of up to £15,000 to grow an existing social enterprise
- Grants of up to £5,000 to start a new social enterprise.

UnLtd are committed to providing 50% of their awards to Black, Asian and minority ethnic social entrepreneurs, and/or disabled social entrepreneurs. To be eligible applicants need to be:

- Aged 16 and over
- Living in the United Kingdom
- Willing to participate in a learning experience
- Working to benefit people living in the United Kingdom
- Have a real social impact
- Fulfil a clear need and demand
- Have clear outputs and goals

7. ENVIRONMENT

European Commission - 2021 European Social Innovation Competition

The Commission is looking for the best socially innovative projects designed to change our society for the better. Three prizes of €50,000 will be awarded to projects for early-stage sustainable ideas that will power the European economy's green and digital future through job creation, growth and European competitiveness. This will include identifying skills gaps as well as approaches to development and

training that will support people to reskill or upskill. The competition is open to individuals, groups and organisations across the European Union, including the UK. **The deadline for applications is 12.00 CEST on 12th May 2021** with 30 semi-finalists announced in July.

HDH Wills - The Martin Wills Wildlife Maintenance grant

The charity provides grants of between £1,000 and £2,000 capital, revenue or project funding to support the conservation and maintenance for the benefit of the public of the natural environment and its indigenous woodland flora and fauna, with particular reference to the conservation and maintenance of the character and amenity of rural areas. In some circumstances up to £5,000 may be available. Applications are welcomed from charities which are registered with the Charity Commission for England and Wales, Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR), or which are exempt or excepted charities. **Applications can be submitted at any time and are considered monthly.**

8. HEALTH & HOSPICES

Pink Ribbon Foundation - Grants

Any UK charity working in the field of breast cancer can apply for a grant of up to £5,000:

- To relieve the needs of people who are suffering from, or have been affected by, breast cancer by providing, or assisting in the provision of, information, care or emotional, practical and financial support.
- To advance public education in the understanding of breast cancer, its early detection and treatment, in particular but not exclusively by commissioning, or conducting, research into the causes, detection and treatment of breast cancer and by disseminating the results of such research.

Higher grants may be awarded if the trustees feel there is a special reason to do so. Applications from general cancer charities must demonstrate that the grants requested will be applied to benefit those affected by breast cancer. Where applications relate to general services, details must be given of how many (and what proportion) of the total number benefiting from the charity's work are affected by breast cancer. **The closing date for applications is 28th May 2021.**

The Newby Trust - Health Grants

The Trust provides grants of up to £10,000 to maintain and improve the mental health of children and young people; support the mental and physical health of older people; and fund medical research with grants of between £2,000 and £10,000. Grants are by invitation but you can email to bring your charity to their attention. The Trust is more likely to fund smaller or medium-sized charities with an annual income of less than £1,000,000.

9. HOUSING & HOMELESS

Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG) – The Homelessness Winter Transformation Fund 2021/22

Small-to-medium homelessness charities, community and faith groups and voluntary sector organisations can apply for funding to provide support for people sleeping rough in England during winter 2021/22. The aim of the Fund is to develop accommodation options that are self-contained, Covid-secure and dignified for people sleeping rough. 1/3 of the funding is capital and 2/3 is revenue funding, and will be managed by Homeless Link in partnership with Housing Justice. 2. Small Grant Programme for charities with an income of less than £350,000 which is focused on Social & Criminal Justice and Older People. Grants are for up to £7,000.

11.SPORTS AND LEISURE

Made by Sport - #ClubsInCrisis Covid-response Fund

Grants of up to £2,021 are available to local sports clubs and third sector organisations across the UK to improve the lives of disadvantaged young people affected by the pandemic. Funds are available for projects using sport to help young people (aged 5 - 25) develop life skills, reduce crime and anti-social behaviour, improve employability skills, or tackle mental health issues. Priority will be given to organisations that need funding support to save them from closure. Match funding is encouraged. All grants must fully spent by September 31st 2021. The Community Foundation for Surrey is administering the Fund in this area. **The closing date for applications is 9am on Monday 17th May 2021.**

12.WELFARE

Armed Forces Covenant Fund - Force for Change programme

Grants of up to £10,000 are available for projects supporting Armed Forces communities to become less isolated and engage more in their local area and the needs that have arisen as a result of Covid-19.

To be eligible to apply, the applicant organisation must be:

- An established registered charity or Community Interest Company (CIC) with substantial recent experience of supporting Armed Forces communities;
- An Armed Forces unit or base;
- A local authority;
- A school.

The Trust will fund a wide range of projects under this programme. However, applicants must be able to show that their project fits under one of these two main themes.

- Empowering Armed Forces communities to become more engaged in their local area.
- Providing opportunities for isolated members of the Armed Forces community to take part in activities that improve general wellbeing.

In light of the Covid-19 pandemic the Trust will be welcoming applications for projects that help Armed Forces communities move to the 'new normal' while continuing to support local needs and reduce isolation. There will be a particular focus on ensuring volunteers can carry out local projects. **The closing date for applications is noon on 2nd August 2021.**

Energy Saving Trust - Energy Redress Scheme

Charities can now apply for funding from only one of the four funds available, to support energy consumers in vulnerable situations by distributing payments from energy companies who may have breached rules. There are four funds available:

- the Small Project Fund for grants of between £20,000 and £49,999 to support energy consumers in vulnerable situations;
- the Main Fund for grants of between £50,000 and £750,000 to support energy consumers in vulnerable situations;
- the Innovation Fund for grants of between £50,000 and £500,000 for innovative product and/or service development;
- and the Carbon Emissions Reduction Fund for grants of between £50,000 and £500,000 for projects that reduce carbon use and accelerate the transition to net zero.

The deadline for applications is 5pm on 6th May 2021.

13.GENERAL

Cooperative Bank - Customer Donation Fund

The money can be used to support special projects and fundraising activities. All Community Directplus account holders are eligible to apply. **The closing date is 30th September.**

Funding is available of between £500 and £20,000 (for multi year grants) for small organisations and UK registered charities working in the counties with which we have an historical association which includes Surrey. To be eligible to apply for a County Grant, your annual income must be below £250,000, unless you are working county-wide, in which case your income must be below £1 million. Veterans Foundation - Grants

The Foundation was created to establish a new and nationwide source of funding to help charities and other organisations that support serving and former members of the British Armed Forces, and sometimes their dependants, who are in need. Charities and organisations conducting charitable activities for serving and former members of the UK's armed forces and their dependants may apply for projects to cover every aspect of social care including: homelessness, employability, poverty, disability, welfare issues, mental health, marriage guidance, care during old age and confidence building. The maximum available grant is £30,000 but Trustees will also consider a bid for a spread grant, i.e. £30K as £10K for each of the next three years. **The deadline for applications is 21 May 2021. NB. You will need to register for an account.**

Morrisons Foundation – Grants

UK registered charities can apply for grants for community projects that improve people's lives. In the main grants are available to fully fund projects up to £25,000. Applicants must demonstrate how the project will deliver public benefit, who in the community will specifically benefit and how it will bring about positive change. They must also have financial information dating back to 2012 and have raised some of the funding elsewhere. **Applications are accepted on a rolling basis.**

YAPP Charitable Trust – Revenue Grants

Small registered charities with a turnover of less than £40,000 pa that have been established for a minimum of 3 years, and whose work focuses on one of the Trust's priority groups, are eligible to apply for a maximum of £3,000 per year for a maximum of 3 years of running costs. Priority groups are elderly people, children and young people aged 5 - 25, people with physical impairments; learning difficulties or mental health challenges; social welfare - people trying to overcome life-limiting problems of a social, rather than medical, origin (such as addiction, relationship difficulties, abuse, offending); and education and learning (with a particular interest in people who are educationally disadvantaged, whether adults or children). The Fund prioritise:

- Work that is unattractive to the general public or unpopular with other funders
- Services that help to improve the lives of marginalised, disadvantaged or isolated people
- Applicants that can demonstrate an effective use of volunteers
- Charities that seek to be preventive and aim to change opinion and behaviour through raising awareness of issues, education and campaigning
- Applicants that can demonstrate (where feasible) an element of self sustainability by charging subscriptions/fees to service users

Applications can be submitted at any time. NB. Registration is required in order to apply.
