1. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy – The Social Housing Decarbonisation Fund

Registered providers of social housing in England will be able to bid for funding to improve the energy performance of their social homes. The Fund will open to applications in autumn 2021 to upgrade 'a significant amount' of social housing stock, delivering warm, energy-efficient homes, reducing carbon emissions and fuel bills, tackling fuel poverty, and supporting green jobs. Funding will be available in this round for projects delivering up to March 2023. Housing associations will not be able to apply directly to the fund, but will be able to apply as part of a local authority led bid. Free technical support will be available to bidders later this summer along with further information on the bidding window.

UK Space Agency - Competition to Inspire Future Space Scientists

The competition will call on young people aged 16 or above to design a nanosatellite to support the UK's decarbonisation drive. Entries are being welcomed from anyone in the UK, either individually or as part



of a team, to compete for the £600,000 Challenge Fund which will enable the winners to develop and manufacture their satellite design to subsequently launch from a UK spaceport and help monitor the impacts of climate change from orbit. Specifications, such as weight, size, and licensing requirements, will be outlined when the competition opens in the Autumn 2021.

Department for Education - Funding for International School Exchanges

School Exchange visits put on hold due to the Covid-19 pandemic can now go ahead with funding from the Department for Education, in partnership with the British Council. Schools already awarded funding under the International Exchanges for Schools in England programme 2019-20 are eligible to continue under the programme in 2021-22 to enable students to spend time exchanging knowledge, culture and experiences with other pupils around the world. Grants can cover international travel for pupils and accompanying teachers, accommodation and subsistence, local transport and administration costs. Trips should have a curriculum focus and/or support soft skills, and do not need to focus on language learning. The criteria for a project to maintain its eligibility will be available in Autumn 2021.

2. ARTS, CULTURE & HERITAGE

Comic Relief - Smiles Fund

Funding of between £100,000 and £300,000 will be awarded to between eight and twelve charities in the UK for proposals which use participation in the arts and comedy to challenge stigma and provide community-based support for people who are experiencing emerging symptoms of poor mental wellbeing. Funding will support a mixture of project and core costs for proposals that are shaped by people with lived experience, including those facing:

- discrimination and disadvantage
- prolonged uncertainty and unemployment
- emerging mental wellbeing challenges
- loss and isolation

Comic Relief will be hosting Zoom Q&A sessions to answer any questions applicants may have about the fund.

- Zoom Session 2 (opens in new window) – Thursday 19th August, 10am-11am
- Zoom Session 3 (opens in new window) – Wednesday 25th August, 2.30pm-3.30pm

Youth Music Network – Incubator Fund

Businesses, collectives and not-for-profits working in the music industries can apply for grants of £5,000 to £30,000 to help open up sustainable work opportunities and careers in music for people aged 18-25, particularly those who are underrepresented; and to support creative employers to innovate and incubate new and diverse talent. This includes both musicians and those who want to work in wider industry roles. **The closing date for applications is 5pm on 20th August 2021.**

Theatres Trust - Small Grants Programme

Not-for-profit theatres across the UK can apply for grants of up to £5,000 to carry out essential works, particularly improvements to buildings that protect theatre use and remove barriers to participation and attendance. The grants will support small projects that make a big impact to a theatre's resilience, sustainability or accessibility. To be eligible to apply to the scheme, applicants must demonstrate that they:

- own or manage theatres with titles or signed leases of more than 5 years
- run a year-round programme of live performance, of no less than 30 performances a year
- have a bona fide UK charitable or not-for-profit legal structure and be able to provide certified or audited accounts for at least two years

Eligible projects include small capital works, the installation of key plant and machinery and works that make theatre buildings digital-ready. Applications are also welcome for projects that help theatres reopen as Covid-secure. **The deadline for applications is 5pm on 8th November 2021.**

The Elephant Trust - Grants to Help New, Innovative Visual Arts Projects

The Trust offers grants to artists for new, innovative visual arts projects. It aims to make it possible for artists and those presenting their work to undertake and complete projects when confronted by lack of funds and supports projects that develop and improve the knowledge, understanding and appreciation of the fine arts. Priority is given to artists and small organisations and galleries making or producing new work or exhibitions. The Trust normally awards grants of up to £2,000, but larger grants of up to £5,000 may be considered. **The deadline for applications is 10th October 2021.**

3. BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT, EMPLOYMENT, EDUCATION & TRAINING

Business and Academic Partnerships - Knowledge Transfer Partnership (KTP).

A KTP enables an academic or research organisation as a partner to a business (including social enterprises and other not for profit organisations) to recruit a suitable graduate (an Associate) to work at the company for the duration of the KTP. The business is thus able to access new skills and the latest academic thinking to deliver a specific, strategic innovation project. KTPs can last between 12 and 36 months, depending on the project and the needs of the business.

The KTP 3-way partnership will consist of:

A UK-based business of any size or a not-for-profit organisation

An academic or research organisation i.e. university, college or research and technology organisation in the UK

A suitably-qualified graduate with the capability to lead a strategic business project

The KTP can be part-funded by a grant from Innovate UK with the business partner contributing to the salary of the Associate plus the cost of a supervisor who will oversee the scheme. Contributions will depend on the scale and length of the project and the size of the company i.e.

- Small and medium-sized enterprises contribute around £35,000 per year, about one-third of the project costs
- Large businesses contribute around £55,000 per year, or half of the project costs

Applications may be submitted either via a KTP Adviser who will check the feasibility of the idea and find the right partner or, where there is already a partnership with an academic or research organisation, via that organisation's KTP office. **The deadline for applications to this round is the 29th September 2021.**

UK Government – Flexi-job apprenticeship scheme

A new scheme has been launched to make apprenticeships more flexible in response to the changing world of work. Flexi-job apprenticeships will help employers overcome structural barriers to making greater use of apprenticeships. Sector bodies, groups of employers and other interested organisations are being invited to register as Flexi-job apprenticeship agencies and to apply for grants of between £100,000 and £1 million to support new agencies with their start-up costs. The first apprenticeships are expected to start in early 2022 and will enable an apprentice to work across a range of projects and with different employers. **Organisations must first apply to the register of flexi-job apprenticeship agencies before submitting their full application by 12pm on the 6th October 2021.**

Royal Society of Chemistry – Outreach Fund

Individuals and organisations such as researchers, museums, schools, community groups, not-for-profit organisations, arts groups and libraries can apply for grants of up to £10,000 to run chemistry-based events and activities for public audiences and in schools. Applications for schools engagement activities should demonstrate how the proposed activities will:

- enrich student's chemistry education and not solely deliver the curriculum
- provide students with opportunities to explore chemistry through local contexts, AND/OR
- demonstrate career opportunities and develop employability skills, AND/OR
- provide opportunities which would not normally be accessible to the students taking part, e.g for hard-to-reach student audiences.

Applications for public engagement activities should demonstrate how the proposed activities will:

- increase chemists' visibility as approachable people AND/OR
- increase the public's confidence in discussing chemistry AND/OR
- demonstrate the relevance of chemistry to everyday interests and concerns.

The Outreach Fund is split into two categories: small grants - up to £5,000 and large grants - up to £10,000. **The closing date for both grants programmes is 6th September 2021.**

Department for Education - Funding to Host T Level Industry Placements

Employers can claim £1,000 for every T Level student they host on an industry placement. The technical qualifications, which have been created in conjunction with more than 250 employers and are equivalent to three A Levels, consist of a mixture of classroom study and industry placements. The scheme will aim to ensure employers impacted by the pandemic can continue to host these industry placements. To be eligible to claim for an incentive payment, employers need to have committed to working with their local school or college to deliver a high-quality industry placement and **this placement must have an agreed a start date between 27 May 2021 and 31 July 2022**. Employers will be able to claim for a maximum of 20 students on placements lasting 45 days or 315 hours.

Institute of Physics - School Grants to Promote Physics

UK schools, colleges or home school groups can apply for grants of up to £600 for small-scale projects or events linked to the teaching or promotion of physics and engineering to pupils aged 5 - 19. Grants can

support a wide range of projects such as school-based science weeks, extracurricular activities, science clubs, careers event or a visit from a working physicist or engineer and may be used for the following purposes: materials/resources; transport; marketing and publicity; other purposes deemed appropriate by the judges; and supply cover (in certain circumstances). The Institute of Physics is interested in proposals that look at:

- particle physics
- astronomy
- space and nuclear physics
- energy
- transport
- information and communications
- design and promotion
- built environment.

The deadline for applications is 1 November 2021.

The Hellenic Society – Grants to Promote the Teaching of Greek

The Society makes grants to schools to assist projects concerned with the teaching of Greek or Greek civilization. Typically, grants are made for:

- The development of new courses in Greek
- Books & other teaching materials
- Classics days or conferences
- Greek plays by schools
- Summer schools for school pupils

Applications from schools planning to start courses in Greek are especially welcome. Applications on behalf of individual pupils or teachers are not normally considered, but a grant may be made to an institution for use as bursaries to individuals at the discretion of that institution. Most grants are in the range £100-£500, but larger awards are occasionally made. **The deadline for applications is 1 October 2021.**

4. CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

Greggs Foundation - Breakfast Club Grants

Primary schools that are interested in applying for funding to open a breakfast club at their school must be able to show that;

- at least 40% of pupils qualify for free school meals;
- that the school serves a disadvantaged community;

- should be able to attract adult volunteers to help run the scheme; and
- attendance at the club must be free for all pupils.

The Foundation uses the grants to support breakfast clubs through an initial start up grant for equipment such as chest freezers to store food items or toys and activities for the club. It also makes a payment each term towards other food items and Greggs plc donates bread from the nearest shop.

Although applications can be made at any time, there is currently a waiting list for funding.

Community Foundation for Surrey – Surrey Young People’s Fund

SYPF provides grants to individuals (aged 16-25 inclusive) who are resident in Surrey. The purpose of the funding is to assist young people move towards an identified goal in education, training, apprenticeship or employment and to gain the skills to help them with future paid employment. They may be deterred from pursuing volunteer opportunities because they are unable to pay the travel costs, lack the necessary clothing or are unable to pay fees for training or equipment. Grants from the Fund are modest – typically up to £300. Applicants are likely to be financially disadvantaged and might typically be educational under-achievers, not in full time employment or be restricted by health conditions. They might also be carers, care leavers or ex-offenders. **There is no deadline for applications.**

William Wates Memorial Trust - Grants

Grants of between £30,000 and £50,000 are available to charities and not for profit organisations that work with disadvantaged young people to keep them away from anti-social behaviour and criminal activity and enable them to fulfil their potential. Funding is available for up to three years and the Trust is particularly interested in supporting projects that continue to have an impact once the funding has stopped. **The deadline for applications is 3rd September 2021.**

Buttle UK - Chances for Children Grants

Grants of up to £2,000 are available to support the needs of vulnerable children and young people who have experienced a recent crisis or change in life that has had a significant impact on their social and emotional wellbeing and their education. Support might include items and activities to support learning and development such as laptops, books, wi-fi, educational toys, tuition, etc; clothing and school uniforms; and social, sporting and leisure activities; and items for children/young people’s bedrooms.

Buttle UK will only accept applications from frontline professionals (from a registered charity, housing association or public sector organisation):

- who are working directly with the children/young person
- ideally, have carried out at least one home visit
- and have made a full assessment of the children's or young person's needs

SAP - Meet and Code and Tech Trust.

Organisations with beneficiaries between the age 8-24 or those looking to partner with youth-based charities are invited to apply, with the Meet and Code initiative aiming to support a number of events that inspire and encourage young people to learn more about digital and coding, in whatever form charities choose. Selected organisations will receive €500 to fund an event with no limit on number of attendees, providing the event is free of charge. 5. COMMUNITY

Woking Borough Council - Community Grants Scheme 2022/3

The Scheme is now open **only** to revenue applications (e.g. running costs) and not capital applications (e.g. equipment purchases). Organisations will be advised of the outcome in early January and successful applicants will be able to claim funds awarded during the period from April 2022 to March 2023.

Due to the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic, the Council will be allocating a reduced budget to the Scheme which means that the Council will be able to support fewer community groups than usual, and those that are supported are likely to receive a lower level of grant. In addition, those organisations which the Council is able to support may be asked to enter into a Service Level Agreement with a particular service area within the Council, instead of receiving funds through the grants scheme.

The deadline for applications is Friday, 3 September 2021. Please note that applicants need to register in order to receive an application form so early registration is recommended.

Power to Change - Community Shares Booster Programme

The programme provides existing community businesses that are either planning to make or have recently launched community shares offers with match funding of up to £100,000. Development grants of up to £10,000 are also available to help societies get investment ready and meet standards of good practice. Additional business development support will also be provided. There are three different pathways of funding:

- **Pathway 1:** Grant to prepare the share offer.
- **Pathway 2:** Equity for investment ready businesses.
- **Pathway 3:** Equity for live share offers.

Applications from community businesses that will breathe new life into high streets through the regeneration of historic buildings are particularly welcome. **Applications can be submitted at any time.**

6. DIVERSITY & EQUALITY

Sir Jules Thorn Charitable Trust - Ann Rylands Small Donations Programme

Charities supporting sick and disadvantaged people across the UK can apply for grants of up to £2,500. Funding supports projects of a humanitarian nature or supplement core funding, with priority given to organisations supporting the elderly, people with disabilities or living with serious illness, or those facing challenges with mental health, social exclusion, homelessness or other difficulties in their lives. **Applications can be made at any time.**

Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust - Rights and Justice (JRCT)

A range of organisations including registered, excepted or exempt charities based in the UK can apply for grants for work that seeks to make positive change across the UK as a whole, or across one or more of its member countries - England, Scotland, Wales or Northern Ireland. The Funding priorities for the Rights and Justice theme are:

- Protection and promotion of human rights and their enforcement in the UK
- Promoting rights and justice for minorities who face the most severe forms of racism
- Promotion of rights and justice for refugees and other migrants by identifying and tackling structures and systems that may deny them their rights.
- Responding to the dual harms of Covid-19 and systemic racism.

Whilst the focus is to support national advocacy and campaigning, JRCT is open to applications which aim to effect change at local and regional levels of policy-making, provided the applicant can demonstrate the wider significance of the work. JRCT places an emphasis on supporting those who have direct experience of racism and oppression. Applicants are encouraged to apply for a grant for unrestricted or core support, although support for specific programme or project funding is also available. **The deadline to register is 12th November 2021 and the deadline to apply is 5pm on 29th November 2021.**

7. ENVIRONMENT

Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs - Future Farming Resilience Fund

DEFRA is making tailored business support available to farmers during the UK's transition away from the EU's Common Agricultural Policy. The Fund will support farmers or land managers in receipt of Basic Payment Scheme payments from August 2021 through to March 2022 to help them navigate the changes during this period. The support will enable farmers to

- help understand the changes that are happening as a result of the Agricultural Transition;
- identify how, what and when you may need to adapt your business model;
- access tailored support to address these changes.

Funding has been awarded to nineteen organisations to provide this support to farmers and land managers who are encouraged to sign up to the scheme. Details of the organisations are on the website.

8. HEALTH & HOSPICES

Public Health England – The Voluntary, Community and Social Enterprise (VCSE) Health and Wellbeing Fund 2021/22

Grants of between £75,000 and £300,000 are available to families and children's services to respond to a predicted surge in respiratory infections in children during autumn/winter 2021. Funding will be awarded to local and national VCSE organisations in England who are delivering existing services that can be expanded to provide additional support for children, families and children's respiratory and acute services and raise awareness of management of respiratory infections within communities that experience the greatest health inequalities. This is a short-term fund, with all funding to be spent by the end of March 2022. **The deadline for applications is 12 noon on 27th August 2021.**

9. HOUSING & HOMELESS

CRASH – Support for Homeless Charities and Hospices

CRASH offers practical help by sourcing pro bono expertise and construction products as well as providing cash grants. It brings together the industry and channels the expertise and products of its Patron Companies to:

- transform hostels, day centres, night shelters and move on accommodation for homeless people;
- create caring environments where adults and children who need end of life care in a hospice, can spend precious time together with their families.
- reduce the cost and increase the quality of your construction project.

To be eligible for support organisations must be registered charities, have legal hold on the building in question, either freehold or lease for at least 5 years, and the building is currently delivering, or will be used to deliver services to single homeless men and women over the age of 18; or used to deliver in-patient and or day services to people in need of end of life care. **Please phone CRASH before making an application to discuss the project** and the ways in which CRASH may be able to help.

Charities Aid Foundation - The Community Led Housing Fund (CLH)

This Fund aims to empower community groups to plan and build 1,000 affordable homes in communities across England. The fund, led by CAF Venturesome, the social investment arm of the Charities Aid Foundation (CAF), is funded by a group of charities and benefactors including the Nationwide Foundation and is open for applications for loans, standby facilities and grants at every stage of the project. The maximum amount of funding available is £150,000, including financial help in purchasing land. **Five year programme from 2019.**

Homes England – First Homes scheme

House builders in England are being invited to bid for their share of funding to support the roll-out of the scheme to help key workers and first-time buyers onto the housing ladder. The funding will help



house builders deliver 1,500 properties by March 2023 that can be sold at 30% below market value. The package will give house builders the opportunity to engage with local councils and mortgage providers, understand the expected level of customer demand and to learn more about the delivery process ahead of the full roll out through planning. **Expressions of interest should be submitted by 12pm on 13th September 2021.**

10. OLDER PEOPLE

Moore Kingston Smith & Dunhill Medical Trust - Capability Development Scheme

Following on from the pandemic, community organisations need to focus on key aims and demonstrate to commissioners, funders and other stakeholders the impact of their work in the communities they serve. Part of understanding impact requires consideration of financial sustainability, understanding the full cost of delivering services and ensuring in the longer-term that a clear and achievable fundraising strategy is in place. On offer is the funded provision of a team of specialist advisers who can provide transformative support to organisations emerging from the pandemic into a new era that will see the re-positioning of charitable services. Part of the programme is designed to provide a diagnostic overview of the priorities for applicant organisations and this, coupled with any existing available internal needs analysis, will form the basis of a specially designed support package. To apply, you must be a community organisation (any third sector organisation) with a local and/or community focus providing services and support to older people. This is defined as work with people over 60 and your work must be predominantly with this age group – at least 75%. The offer includes:

- bespoke and specialist support following diagnosis of the main organisational requirement
- access to a team of specialists in key distinct skills areas, and
- a mentoring process with a clear, bespoke action plan and any additional recommendations.

12.WOMEN & GIRLS

Innovate UK - Women in Innovation Awards

Innovate UK is offering Awards to at least twenty female entrepreneurs across the UK to fund and support women with innovative ideas and ambitious plans that will inspire others. Female founders, co-founders and senior decision makers within UK registered micro or SME businesses that have been operating for at least one year are eligible for an award of £50,000, and a bespoke package of mentoring, coaching and business support. Applicants must be confident that they can make a significant contribution to a pressing societal, environmental and/or economic challenge through projects across a variety of innovation areas. Anyone who self-identifies as a woman is also eligible to apply. Applications open on 23rd August 2021 and **there will be an online briefing on 24th August. See link below to register. Small charities, not-for-profit groups and social entrepreneurs with an average annual income below £50,000 in the past 12 months, and who are passionate about making a difference to people, their community or the environment, can apply for a share of £10,000 which will be voted for by John Good Group employees. The project that receives the most votes will receive a grant of £3,500, second place £2,500, third place £2,000 with fourth and fifth place both receiving £1,000. As well as established projects and charities, the Foundation are keen to hear from people with innovative ideas that need
