2. ARTS, CULTURE & HERITAGE

The Arts Council England - Let's Create Jubilee Fund

Grants of up to £10,000 are available to voluntary and community organisations with charitable aims. However, the application itself has to be focused on creative and cultural activity and applicants must partner with an artist, creative or cultural organisation to help deliver their project. The Fund opens to applications on Tuesday 4th January and **an informal Q&A session has been organised for 13th January at 2pm. The National Lottery – Heritage Fund

Not-for-profit organisations and private owners of heritage across the UK, including faith based or church organisations and local authorities, can apply for grants of between £3,000 and £5 million from the National Lottery Heritage Fund for projects connecting people and communities to UK heritage. Projects should aim to improve the condition of heritage; allow for heritage to be identified and better explained; and ensure that people have learned about local heritage, leading to changes in ideas and actions. There is a focus on landscape and nature, and community heritage. Three levels of funding are available:



- grants from £3,000 to £10,000
- grants from £10,000 to £250,000
- grants from £250,000 to £5million

Priority will be given to projects that

- promote inclusion and involve a wider range of people;
- boost the local economy ;
- encourage skills development and job creation;
- support wellbeing;
- create better places to live, work and visit;
- and improve the resilience of organisations working in heritage.

There are no deadlines for applications for under £250,000. For applications exceeding £250,000 the deadline is 24th February 2022.

The National Churches Trust - Gateway Grant Programme

Grants of between £3,000 and £10,000 are available to listed and unlisted Christian places of worship, of any denomination, across the UK towards project development and investigative work up to RIBA planning stage 1, to support churches preparing for a major project, and in developing their project to the point at which they can approach a major grant funder. The Programme is also now able to offer:

- grants of between £3,000 and £10,000 for urgent and essential maintenance and repair projects costing between £10,000 and £100,000.
- grants of between £3,000 and £10,000 to local church trusts to fund projects that support organisational development, increase their capacity to churches in their area or that deliver new ways of supporting churches in their area.

All grants will represent a maximum of 50% of the net project costs. **The deadline for applications is midnight on 13th January 2022.**

Funding is available for the UK's most talented young instrumentalists in any genre, aged five to 17 years of age who, because of financial need, may be prevented from fulfilling their creative potential. **No deadline for applications.**

The Pilgrim Trust – Preservation & Scholarship Grants

Grants are available to charities and public bodies that preserve the fabric of historically important buildings, conserve significant collections and promote knowledge through academic research with particular consideration given to:

- Preservation of, and repairs to, buildings or architectural features of outstanding architectural or historic importance particularly those at risk
- Conservation of important artefacts and collections
- Promotion of knowledge and its dissemination through academic research within institutions where historic, scientific or archaeological records are preserved.

Small Grants are under £5,000. Main Grants are over £5,000 with the average being around £25,000.

No deadline for applications but the next meeting of trustees will be in March 2022.

Paul Hamlyn Foundation - Arts Access & Participation Fund

The Foundation offers grants for organisations to widen and deepen participation in the arts including investing in young people. Applications are for between £30,000 and £400,000 for activity lasting between 12 months and 4 years with an option to extend for a further period. Most grants are in the £60,000 to £250,000 range.

3. BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT, EMPLOYMENT, EDUCATION & TRAINING

Low Carbon Across the South and East (LoCASE) Grant Programme

Grants of between £1,000 and £10,000 are available as well as training workshops and fully funded attendance at events. Charities and SMEs are eligible to apply for funding to implement energy efficiency and sustainability measures and for product development and marketing for “green” or low carbon goods and services. Conditions apply and there is an Eligibility Quiz to complete on the website. The objective is to help these charities and business become more competitive and profitable while protecting the environment and encouraging low carbon solutions. **Funding is available until Spring 2023.**

UK-German Connection - School Partnership Bursaries

Schools across the UK are invited to apply for Partnership Bursaries of £1,000 to help them maintain existing links with schools in Germany. The funding is available for a range of joint activities between existing partner schools that support direct contact between young people from both countries. They are designed to support a range of activities over the course of a year and are aimed at keeping school partnerships alive. They can be used for more than one activity in a year and to support multiple target groups. Further grants are available for thematic projects, planning visits and first-time visits for schools and youth groups. Bursaries can cover pupil or teacher travel, accommodation and subsistence, materials for joint projects, virtual activities, and hosting partners etc. They can also partially be used towards safeguarding costs / police checks, supply cover, insurance, and hardware. **The deadline for applications is 31st January 2022.**

Foyle Foundation - Schools Library Programme

State funded schools as well as dedicated schools that do not have or want to improve their libraries can apply for funding. Secondary schools are eligible, but primary schools and funding library books are a higher priority. The Foundation will also consider contributions towards e-readers, library software, necessary IT equipment and specialist seating/desks. Preference will be given to schools which can clearly demonstrate that their library can be maintained and renewed in the future. Applications can be made for grants of between £1,000 and £10,000. **Applications can be submitted at any time.**

4. CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

The High Sheriff for Surrey - Youth Awards

Grants between £100 and £2,000, exceptionally up to £5,000 are available for projects that aim to help young people make Surrey safer. **No deadline for applications.**

Funding is available for the purchase of essential items to meet the most basic needs of children and young people, up to and including the age of 17, who are experiencing exceptionally difficult

Lawrence Atwell's Charity – Charities Programme Grants

Funding of up to £10,000 per year for up to three years is available to registered charities and not-for-profit organisations in England and Wales to help young people from low-income backgrounds free themselves from poverty and disadvantage. Grants are awarded to help young people who are not in employment, education or training (NEET) to move into employment or become employment ready. The programme supports projects which help young people improve their life chances by attaining a vocational qualification and helping them move into work. Priority will be given to organisations in London and Kent. **Applicants should contact the Charity in the first instance and eligible organisations will then be invited to apply in full by the 4th March 2022.**

Adamson Trust - Grants

Individuals, voluntary and community organisations and charities can apply for grants to help with the cost of holidays or respite breaks for disabled children (aged 3 to 17 years) with physical, mental, or emotional impairments. **The deadline for applications is 31st December 2021.**

Wooden Spoon Charity - Grants

Organisations with projects lasting at least 5 years and designed to enhance and support the lives of children and young people under 25 that are disadvantaged physically, mentally or socially can apply for funding. The project must work directly with children and young people and have a positive influence on their lives from the activities or service provided. Projects costing less than £5,000 are unlikely to meet the criteria of the Fund. **No deadline for applications.**

Buttle UK - Chances for Children

Grants of approximately £1,500 are available to enable vulnerable children and young people in the UK to overcome financial barriers preventing them from achieving their education, training or employment. Grants are available to fund a holistic package of support including immediate physical needs by paying for household items, such as a cooker or children's beds, and also to meet a child's longer-term educational and emotional needs, providing things such as course materials and after school activities. **No deadline for applications.**

BlueSpark Foundation – Grants

Schools, colleges, community groups and some individuals may apply for a grant from the Foundation to support the education and development of children and young people with educational, cultural, sporting and other projects. Teachers and people in the community at large are often prepared to give their time to potential projects but they may not have access to the funding to turn those projects into reality. Many worthwhile projects require relatively small-scale funding but that funding may be beyond the reach of the originators of the project. BlueSpark helps to bridge that gap by funding or part funding some of these projects. **No deadline for applications.**

5. COMMUNITY

Hubbub Foundation - Community Fridge Fund

The Co-op Fund is offering grants of £4,000 to support an additional one hundred not-for-profit organisations across the UK to establish new Community Fridge projects and help redistribute surplus fresh food within deprived communities. Donations are provided by local food businesses, producers, households and gardens, saving food from going to waste and bringing people together. Hubbub will also provide support, guidance and resources to help organisations establish their Community Fridge. **The deadline for applications is 1st February 2022.**

Grants are available for all kinds of projects, from repairing buildings and improving facilities in deprived areas, to decorating the homes of people living with sickness and disabilities. **The deadline for applications is 10th February 2022.**

The Foundation will provide funding of between £5,000 and £25,000 to help with building repairs, building improvement/development, and/or outdoor improvement/development for properties which small grassroots community organisations either own or lease. 6. DIVERSITY & EQUALITY

Pleasance Theatre Trust - Generate Fund

Funding is available to help UK-based Black, Asian and Global Majority artists bring work to the Edinburgh Festival Fringe in 2022. The Fund provides financing, mentorship and programming opportunities to help artists overcome barriers due to their race or ethnicity that would otherwise prevent them from performing. A total of £10,000 in funding is available in this round, with theatre or children's productions receiving investment of up to £5,000. For productions to be considered for funding, at least 50% of the lead creators must identify as Black, Asian or Global Majority Artists, and at least 50% of the cast must identify as Global Majority Artists. **The deadline for applications is 10am on 17th January 2022.**

The VINCI UK Foundation – Social Exclusion Fund

Charities and other not-for-profit organisations can apply for grants to improve access to employment, mobility and housing for people suffering from social exclusion. Grants may be used to purchase, upgrade or refurbish transport, equipment, ICT, tools, furniture and facilities for long-lasting projects costing up to £100,000 which help charities to alleviate social exclusion and strengthen communities. This could, for example, include the development of new/current activities, the refurbishment of premises, or the improvement of marketing tools. Successful applicants will also receive the support of a VINCI sponsor, who will donate some of their time and practical expertise to the project.

The application period will be open from January until 31st March 2022 but you can start the process now.

Society for Experimental Biology (SEB) - Diversity Grants

SEB members who have held their membership for a minimum of one year can apply for Diversity Grants of up to £1000 to help tackle barriers to inclusion, and support initiatives that promote diversity in academia and science, specifically within the field of experimental biology. This may include but is not limited to:

- Making your workplace a more inclusive environment for example through the creation of good practice toolkits or holding a diversity training session



- Improving inclusivity at research events you have organised for example, providing financial aid to underrepresented groups or improving accessibility of facilities
- Improving Diversity in your field for example through the creation or support of a mentoring scheme
- Increasing awareness of the contributions of underrepresented groups in experimental biology for example organising hackathons, giveaways, and promotional events.

Applications can be made at any time, but organisations should allow two months between submitting the application and the event taking place.

Lloyds Bank Foundation – Complex Social Issues and Racial Equality Funds

Small registered charities and CIOs working with adults over 17 years with an income of between £25,000 and £1m can apply for a two-year unrestricted grant of £50,000. The Foundation's priority is to reach those charities tackling one of 11 complex social issues such as homelessness, trafficking and domestic abuse, with a proven track record of helping people achieve positive change in their local communities. At least 25% of all funding in 2021 will be allocated to charities led by and for Black, Asian, and Minority Ethnic communities. **Deadline unclear but this information relates to 2021 so criteria may change after 31st December 2021.**

7. ENVIRONMENT

LUSH Charity Pot - Grants

LUSH is offering grants of up to £10,000 to small (with a maximum income of less than £250,000) not-for-profit organisations and campaign groups that are working in the areas of animal protection, the environment and human rights. The average grant is in the region of £2,000 to £4,000. They award funding to 'non-violent direct action' groups, run entirely or predominantly by volunteers, for projects that aim to create long-term change, are unpopular and often overlooked by other funders and they also prefer projects that stop abuse from happening in the first place. **Applications can be made at any time.**

8. HEALTH & HOSPICES

The Elaine & Angus Lloyd Charitable Trust – Grants

The Trust offers grants to charitable organisations to support general charitable activities in the areas of advancement of health or saving of lives, disability, and people with disabilities. Average grants range from £1,000 to £3,500, although grants of up to £20,000 have been awarded in the past. NHS - Blood and Transplant Community Investment Scheme

Community and faith/beliefs organisations across the UK can apply for grants of up to £20,000 to build support for blood and organ donations amongst Black, Asian, mixed heritage and minority ethnic communities. The Scheme will support organisations to engage, educate and recruit more donors. In this latest round of funding, the scheme has broadened its scope to cover a range of health inequalities including blood, organ and stem cells to address the shortage of Black blood donors, whose blood is used to treat conditions like sickle cell, the shortage of ethnically matched organs for those waiting for a transplant, as well as the need for ethnically matched stem cell donors. **The deadline for applications is 5pm on 9th January 2022.**

The Gamesys Foundation Charitable Trust – Grants

Registered charities and other not-for-profit organisations who support individuals suffering from mental health issues, as well as those who focus on research in the mental health field, with an income of more than £50,000 are eligible to apply for funding. The Foundation will also consider funding for other types of organisation so long as they can be proven to have an impact with regard to mental health issues, support, and treatment. There is no minimum or maximum grant amount. **Applications can be made at any time.**

9. HOUSING & HOMELESS

National Grid and Affordable Warmth Solutions - Warm Homes Fund

The fund incentivises the installation of affordable heating solutions in fuel poor households with the aim of reducing bills, increasing comfort in non-gas fuel poor households, and improving health outcomes. This round is accepting bids from local authorities and registered social landlords working with other local partners across England, Wales and Scotland for low carbon first time central heating solutions, or energy efficiency and health related solutions. **Bids must be submitted by midday on the 21st January 2022.**

Lloyds Banking Group and Homes England - Housing Growth Partnership

UK small and medium enterprise and regional housebuilders building between five and five hundred units per year are eligible for support under this scheme which is an equity fund to support the development of 10,000 new homes by 2025. The funding will enable investment into larger housebuilding projects, with up to £10 million per investment available for projects with a development value of up to £75 million. It will offer support for the delivery of a wider range of housing projects, including Build to Rent, Regeneration and Retirement Living, and will look to prioritise projects with a greater sustainability focus, as well as those using modern methods of construction and other evolutionary construction methods.

10. OLDER PEOPLE

Friends of the Elderly - Grants for Older People

Grants of up to £400 are available to older people who are of/over state pension age and have savings of less than £4,000. Funding is currently being provided through four schemes:



- Home Essentials to help with the cost of replacing everyday items, small home repairs and mobility adaptations;
- Digital Connection to help older people get online;
- Financial Support to help with unexpected bills; and
- Essential Living Costs including clothing, food, medicines and books.

Bernard Sunley - Social Welfare Grants

Through the Social Welfare funding strand, the Foundation supports veterans, the elderly, ex-offenders and those in prison and schemes that enable people with mental and physical disabilities to live fuller lives in the community. Funding is only available to registered charities unless the organisation has 'accepted' status, i.e. churches, schools and scout and guide groups, or 'exempt' status, e.g. housing associations, friendly societies including social housing providers and industrial & provident societies. Only capital items are funded and there are three levels of grants:

- Large grants of £20,000 and above.
- Medium grants of up to £20,000.
- Small grants of £5,000 and under.

Applications can be submitted at any time. Small grants are agreed by Trustees on a monthly basis and form the majority of grants awarded.

11. SPORTS & LEISURE

Peter Harrison Foundation – Opportunities Through Sport
